



We served **227** clients in our Human Trafficking Victim Services program.

46% of known victims experienced sex trafficking, **44%** experienced labor trafficking, and **10%** experienced both.

- 20%** Unknown Human Trafficking Experiences
- 16%** Police Operation, No Assessment
- 15%** Did Not Experience Human Trafficking



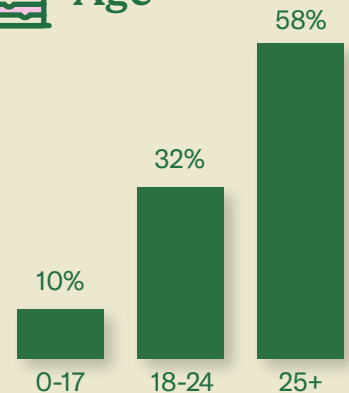

Supporting Diverse Experiences and Needs

- 50%** of clients served were foreign nationals
- 51%** of clients served spoke a language other than English
- 31%** of clients served were experiencing homelessness at intake

Most Common Services Provided

- Immigration Assistance
- Individual Advocacy
- Referral to other services, supports, and resources

Since October 2020, we've served **412** known victims of human trafficking. **41%** experienced sex trafficking, **54%** experienced labor trafficking, and **5%** experienced sex and labor trafficking.
