Human Trafficking Victim Services

- 139** New Clients were Served
- 33%** Sex Trafficking
 - 5%** Self-identified Sex Trafficking
- 33%** Labor Trafficking
 - 2%** Self-identified Labor Trafficking
- 6%** Sex and Labor Trafficking
- 4%** Unknown Human Trafficking Experience
- 6%** Police Operation, No Assessment
- 11%** Did Not Experience Human Trafficking



Top 3 Referral Sources

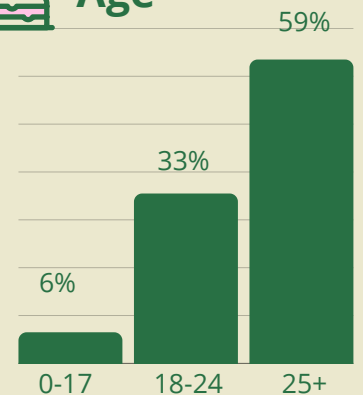

Training Highlights

Trained corrections officers on human trafficking to support implementation of screening for trafficking in jails

Educated workers rights groups on labor trafficking

Began providing presentations on human trafficking to community groups

New Research

CHNJ authored new research titled *The Intersection of Youth Homelessness, Human Trafficking, and Disabilities* in the journal *Child Welfare* in November 2024, building upon findings of prior research from CHNJ showing a relationship between special education services and human trafficking.

Survivors with IEP/504 plans faced high rates of trauma, instability, and early exploitation, and protective factors were less effective.
